Notes on our program

During the last few years, the academic leadership of St. Olaf College has chosen a campus-wide theme, around which the faculty can guide readings, discussion and discourse. This year's theme is *migration*, which Merriam-Webster defines in part as:

Etymology: Latin *migratus*, past participle of migrare; perhaps akin to Greek *ameibein* to change.

1: to move from one country, place, or locality to another

The inspiration for tonight's program comes from one of our musical selections, *In Paradisum*, a piece that is all about migration: a soul's passage from life into earthly death; a son's journey through grief and acceptance... The composer, Eric Sayre '10, brought a draft of this work to me last spring — only weeks after the loss of his father. Inside the front cover, Eric writes:

In Paradisum depicts my childhood fantasy of the journey a soul must take before reaching paradise. I began composing this piece with a hypothetical soul in mind; however, less than a year later when my father passed away, the work immediately began to take new shape. I grew up in a family of multiple faiths, so the loss of my father inevitably raised many theological questions. This piece is my conclusion. It is not a debate between Judaism and Christianity, but rather a harmonious marriage of the two.

From here, with this journey in mind, we worship this evening, using the Vespers liturgy and hymnody from *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*. The singing begins with a Dala melody arranged by Margareta Jalkeus, founder of The Real Group. Its words of promise and blessing recall Jesus' path to Jerusalem, strewn with palms, garments, and praise. The simple, winding melody sung by the altos in the first verse masks the jazz-inspired harmonies created by the rest of the ensemble.

John Rutter's Agnus Dei from Requiem captures the image of one calling for help, quietly at first, and then with an ever-growing need, until ultimately it becomes an overwhelming plea for mercy. Its intense chromaticism creates a palpable tension harmonically and melodically, and in doing so, makes for stunning contrast with the end of the work when the text says, "I am the Resurrection and the Life." English words from the Book of Common Prayer are interspersed with an ancient chant, (played on the organ) Victimae paschali laudes, prescribed for worship on Easter Sunday (a translation is included in the bulletin). The buoyant and rhythmic Rorando Coeli clearly captures musically the hope of salvation. One can hear the 'springing up' in the soprano voices of each choir.

Eric Sayre has described his *In Paradisum* as a programmatic work, and is clearly divisible into four major sections. The soothing and calm opening section is an open invitation and promise — notice how the men and women exchange English text over the repeated chant of "In paradisum." The second section is a setting of the Jewish Prayer for the Dead (recited at his father's funeral), and again, you will hear the men's and women's voices soaring through these chant-like passages, followed by a brief return to the opening material which Eric describes as "some form of heavenly choir (angels, saints...) reminding the soul of what is to come, that there is something greater on the horizon. That window then quickly closes and is pulled in with other wondering souls." The third section is without words, and Eric calls it "the soul wandering… lost and trying to find its way." One can hear the sense of loss and mourning change into tension and overwhelming grief as the voices enter and layer upon each other. After one climax, this section builds again into a return of the opening section, this time stronger and with the sopranos even higher in their range. A brief coda leaves us with a solo voice proclaiming the same text we heard in the Rutter, "I am the Resurrection and Life…" followed by the choir's final statement in Hebrew, "And let us say, Amen."

Ola Gjeilo's setting of the *Ubi caritas* text truly captures the essence of love and charity in this simple homophonic setting. Following the unison introduction of the chant in the women's voices, colorful harmonies allow the text to lead the movement of the work. Listen closely to the subtle changes in sonority during the text, "et ex corde diligamus, nos sincero / and may we love each other with a sincere heart," and one can hear Gjeilo's understanding of 'sincerity.'

In the 200th anniversary of this birth, we sing Mendelssohn's setting of the Luther text, *Verleih uns Frieden*. Mendelssohn called this piece a cantata, even though might better be called a chorale motet in modern terms. Originally set for orchestra, one can hear the weaving lines of two celli throughout the introduction and interludes played by the organ. In the second verse, something quite different happens: the women sing the chorale tune and text, while the men sing a descant *below* them... It creates a magnificent duet that leads into the strong final verse set for full chorus.

We end our program with an arrangement by Craig Hella Johnson, '84 written by Eliza Gilkyson as a "vehicle for grieving" after the devastating tsunami of 2004. Although its text calls for intercession from "mother mary," an idea contrary to mainstream Protestant theology, it is impossible not to hear and experience the cry for help and comfort of the authors. Gilkyson, in an interview with NPR, described Mary as the "archetype for compassion." The setting of this piece is honest and genuine, and acts as a powerful expression of faith and hope.
