Overture to Candide

Leonard Bernstein (1918-90)

Witty and whimsical, Leonard Bernstein's *Overture to Candide* won instant praise at its premiere in December 1956. Bernstein based his Gilbert and Sullivan–style operetta on French writer and philosopher Voltaire's 1759 *Candide*, a satire centered on the impressionable Candide and his level-headed lover Cungégonde. In the story, Dr. Pangloss, Candide's philosophically minded tutor, teaches his student that "all is best in this best of all possible worlds." After a barrage of comic misadventures and natural disasters, a wiser Candide rejects his master's teachings to embrace a modest life with Cungégonde. While the operetta itself initially proved too intellectually substantial to gain wide success and closed its first run after only 73 performances, it has become increasingly popular in the past few decades.

The Overture sparkles with melodic vivacity and rhythmic brilliance, establishing the operetta's vibrant and fast-paced energy. An opening three-note fanfare provides the basis for development throughout the piece, while syncopated rhythms mark the melodic style. After a lively array of solos in the winds, the violas present the lover's theme based on the lyric and sweeping duet, "Oh, Happy We." Later on, the winds and strings join in canon to introduce an airy and capricious theme from Cungégonde's ditzy parody of soprano arias, "Glitter and be Gay." The piece ends in an exhilarating whirlwind that combines all the previous themes.

Concerto for Flute V. Amhrán **Christopher Rouse (b. 1949)**

Christopher Rouse shared the following notes about his Flute Concerto:

Although no universal credence for the Jungian concept of "genetic memory" exists, for me it seems a profoundly viable notion. Although both of my parents' families immigrated to America well before the Revolutionary War, I nonetheless still feel a deep ancestral tug of recognition whenever I am exposed to the arts and traditions of the British Isles, particularly those of Celtic origin.

I have attempted to reflect my responses to these stimuli in my flute concerto, a five-movement work cast in a somewhat loose arch form. The first and last movements bear the title "Amhrán" (Gaelic for "song") and are simple melodic elaborations for the solo flute over the accompaniment of orchestral strings. They were intended in a general way to evoke the traditions of Celtic, especially Irish, folk music, but to couch the musical utterance in what I hoped would seem a more spiritual, even metaphysical, manner through the use of extremely slow tempi.

Rouse completed his Flute Concerto in Fairport, New York, in August 1993. It was given its premiere performance with the Detroit Symphony.

One of America's most prominent composers of orchestral music, Rouse's works have won a Pulitzer Prize (for his Trombone Concerto) and a Grammy Award (for Concert de Gaudí), as well as election to the prestigious American Academy of Arts and Letters. He has created a body of work perhaps unequalled in its emotional intensity. The *New York Times* has called it "some of the most anguished, most memorable music around." *The Baltimore Sun* has written: "When the music history of the late 20th century is written, I suspect the explosive and passionate music of Rouse will loom large."

Rouse is currently a member of the composition faculty at The Juilliard School in New York. In 2012 he began his two-year tenure as composer in residence with the New York Philharmonic.

Tribal Dance of Yao Mao Yuen (b. 1928)

In 1951 Chinese musician Liu Tieshan visited a Yao tribe in northern Guangdong. While attending a festival in that region, he was inspired by the traditional Yao Dance. Soon thereafter he composed the "Yao Tambourine Dance Song" based upon the traditional dance. Tieshan's "Yao Tambourine Dance Song" became widely known in China. Composer Mao Yuan later arranged the piece for symphony orchestra.

The *Tribal Dance of Yao* depicts vivid dance scenes of the Yao people. The piece's opening section represents the girls' light dance. As more people join in the dance, the orchestration becomes fuller. The solo bassoon presents a variation of the melody again, this time in a quicker tempo. The music builds to a climax before it fades into calm repose. The middle section contrasts with the energetic dance; its singing style in triple meter depicts lovers dancing as they show their affection for each other. The opening theme soon returns, this time alternating strings and woodwinds. Once again, the slow section leads to a brilliant allegro — passion and excitement grow as the piece reaches its powerful and exuberant conclusion.

Liu Tieshan was born in Raoyang, Hebei, in 1923. After graduating from the army's music program in 1941, he pursued his musical studies at Yanbian University. Throughout his career, he took interest in the minority communities of China. He composed music inspired by these cultures and territories, including the *Harvest Guozhuang* from Tibet, *Lamp Dance* from Mongolia, and *Tribal Dance of Yao* from the Yao region.

Mao Yuen was born in Jinan, Shandong. In 1952 he earned his bachelor of music composition degree from the Shandong University. Between 1956 and 1958, he studied in a special program in the Central Conservatory. He served as instructor at the Nanjing University of the Arts, and was promoted to professor in 1987. Currently, he is a member of the Chinese Musicians Association, Chinese Music Aesthetics Association, and the Jiangsu Critics Association.

Medea's Dance of Vengeance

Samuel Barber (1910-81)

Born in 1910, Samuel Barber was one of the most influential 20th century American composers. While audiences remember the composer most for his *Adagio for Strings* and Violin Concerto, he composed dozens of other works regularly performed in the U.S. and abroad.

The origins for *Medea's Dance of Vengeance* trace back to 1946, when prominent American choreographer Martha Graham commissioned Barber to write a ballet score based on the story of Jason and Medea. Immortalized by Greek playwright Euripides, the tragedy recounts the sorceress Medea's vicious revenge on her unfaithful husband Jason. Graham's ballet company premiered the work under the title *The Serpent Heart* on May 10, 1946. After revising the choreography and music, Barber reintroduced the piece in 1947 as a seven-movement suite for orchestra titled *Cave of the Heart*. Barber refashioned the piece again in 1955 into the one-movement *Medea's Meditation and Dance of Vengeance*, which he later shortened to simply *Medea's Dance of Vengeance*.

The first half of the work is an extended meditation in which Medea reflects on her sad state of affairs. The piece opens with a dissonant chord in the upper strings and an angular xylophone solo based on the interval of a major 7th. Lyric woodwind and string solos, tinged with brooding anxiety, establish the pensive, yet uneasy mood. As Medea's jealous mood turns toward vengeance, dynamic outbursts of anger alternate with moments of eerie quiet. A piano ostinato drives the Dance of Vengeance with agitated tension as the winds and strings exchange dissonant banter. The music assumes a frantic mood as the brass and woodwinds savagely propel the dance forward with driving 16th notes, marked by interruptions of percussive syncopation. In a passionate and ferocious coda, the piece ends with a vengeful accelerando, complete with hammering percussion and wailing strings.

Turtle Dove

St. Olaf professor of music Winston Cassler wrote this tender arrangement of the English folk song *The Turtle Dove* especially for the St. Olaf Orchestra in 1960. It is a sentimental favorite of the orchestra and continues to be heard at various concerts each year. Cassler was a member of the faculty from 1949 until his retirement in 1972.

Gavorkna Fanfare (1991)

Jack Stamp (b. 1954)

Gavorkna Fanfare was composed for and dedicated to Eugene Corporon and the University of Cincinnati College – Conservatory of Music Wind Symphony. The work exploits the idea of a fanfare for full wind band, rather than the traditional brass and percussion instrumentation. The opening pyramids lead to the melodic minor third cluster heard in original and inversion simultaneously. A polychordal transition based on the upcoming "fugato" subject leads to a minimalist accompaniment to the four-part counterpoint. The opening idea returns with a coda based on the melodic minor third.

Huntingtower (1932)

Ottorino Respighi (1879–1936)

Ottorino Respighi once said that the "Italian genius is for melody and clarity." These are two qualities apparent in his works, including the notable tone poems *The Fountains of Rome, The Pines of Rome* and *Roman Festivals*. Described as a "painter of sound," Respighi was commissioned by Edwin Franko Goldman, the founding president of the recently established American Bandmasters Association, to compose a new work for wind band. The resultant work was premiered (along with the Gustav Holst masterwork *Hammersmith*) at a concert dedicated to John Philip Sousa, who had passed away just a few weeks earlier. According to the program note from that concert, "the work was inspired during a sojourn at a small place called Huntingtower in Scotland."

Concerto for Marimba (1986)

Ney Rosauro (b. 1952) arr. Tony McCutchen

Ney Rosauro is recognized as one of the most original and dynamic symphonic percussionists and composers today. Born in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, he studied composition and conducting at the Universidade de Brasilia (Brazil), and then received a master's degree in percussion at the Hochschule für Musik Wurzburg in Germany. He completed his doctorate at the University of Miami under the supervision of Fred Wickstrom, where he eventually became the director of percussion studies.

As a composer he has published more than 50 pieces for percussion as well as several method books. His compositions are very popular worldwide and have been recorded by internationally acclaimed artists such as Evelyn Glennie and the London Symphony Orchestra. His *Concerto for Marimba and Orchestra* has been performed by over 2,000 different orchestras worldwide and is considered to be the most popular marimba concerto of our day.

Strange Humors (2006)

John Mackey (b. 1973)

A prolific composer, John Mackey was born in Ohio and studied at the Juilliard School and Cleveland Institute of Music. He particularly enjoys writing for dance and symphonic winds, and his works have been performed in such places as the Sydney Opera House, Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center, Italy's Spoleto Festival, and throughout Europe, Asia, and the United States.

Strange Humors was originally written for string quartet and djembe — conceived while Mackey was pursuing his graduate studies — and later transcribed for wind ensemble at the behest of Richard Floyd on behalf of the American Bandmasters Association. The piece represents a merging of musical cultures — the modal melodies and syncopated rhythms of Middle Eastern music with the percussive accompaniment of African drumming. The core of the piece is embodied by the beat of the *djembe*, an hourglass-shaped drum played by bare hands, which plays a prominent role in the customs of West African countries. Opening with a sensuous English horn solo influenced by the characteristic melodies of Egypt and the Arabian peninsula, the sinuous lines are later taken over by the saxophones. The brass and auxiliary percussion contribute to the impact of the work, while the groove of the *djembe* mingled with eccentric rhythms throughout leave an impression that lingers in the listener's mind long after its conclusion.

Moon River (1961)

A Symphonic Fantasy for Band

Henry Mancini (1924–94)

With lyrics by Johnny Mercer, this Mancini classic was sung by Audrey Hepburn in the 1961 movie *Breakfast at Tiffany's* and was awarded that year's Academy Award for Best Original Song. *Moon River* became the theme song for the long running Andy Williams television show and this further established the work within the pantheon of the great contemporary classics.

Awayday (1996) Adam Gorb (b. 1958)

Educated at Cambridge, Adam Gorb is a major new talent within the British musical world. His wind works have received rave reviews, including the award-winning *Metropolis* (1993), *Yiddish Dances* (1998) and his *Trombone Concerto* (2001).

Noted British conductor Timothy Reynish commissioned *Awayday* and conducted the first performance with the Royal Northern College of Music Wind Ensemble in November 1996. Reynish challenged Gorb to write a work in the idiom of Bernstein's *Overture to Candide* that could replace that masterpiece in programs on

occasion. Gorb writes, "In this five-minute curtain raiser my inspiration has come from the great days of the American Musical Comedy with its irresistible brashness and its irrepressible high spirits. I hope you enjoy it."


