### 4. Notable Alumni

**List Your institution's most prominent alumni/ae along with their titles or fields of endeavor:**

Dr. Elizabeth Guenther Nabel '74 - director of the National Heart Lung and Blood Institutes of Health (NIH). Dr. Nabel earned a bachelor of arts in French and psychology at St. Olaf and an M.D. from Cornell University. She oversees 850 federal employees and an annual budget of almost \$3 billion.

Mark Olson '65 - Federal Reserve Board governor. Olson earned his degree in economics and business education from St. Olaf College. He was the youngest person (at 43) ever elected president of the American Bankers' Association.

Kathryn Wylde '68 - president and chief executive officer of the New York City Partnership & Chamber of Commerce, the city's premiere business leadership organization. Established by David Rockefeller in 1973, the partnership has been responsible for significant programs in housing and economic development, education, public safety and employment.
