St. Olaf is part of the Teagle Project, a four-college collaborative project focusing on racial and ethnic diversity. The first phase of the Teagle project was a campus climate survey conducted in October of 1999. Data collected from the survey is being analyzed and will be reported back to the St. Olaf community by the end of the spring term. Phase 2 of the Teagle project includes the development of collaborative urban immersion experiences in which teams from each of the four campuses will participate. Two immersion experiences will be held over the summer of 2000, one experience will be in New York City the other in Minneapolis/St. Paul.
