

"So Naaman came with his horses and chariots, and halted at the entrance of Elisha's house."

2 Kings 5:9

hat Bible verse is from the story of Elisha the prophet healing Naaman, a military leader of his people's enemy, ancient Aram; a story many people will hear in church mid-February. If you imagine storylines as stems of fruit, this account of Naaman makes its point not so much like one large apple at the end, but like a cluster of grapes picked one by one as the story unfolds. The story's ego-bursting points do what Mary's Magnificat describes; they "bring down the mighty from their thrones and exalt those of low degree."

- The best care and counsel money can buy in the land of Aram does Naaman no good; it is a slave girl, captured from Israel, who has the information Naaman needs to find healing.
- Pride of nationality will have to be given up, it is an impediment to healing; help is across the border in the land of the Israelites.
- Money between Naaman and his king they have plenty — does no good. Gold, silver and fine garments are presented to the King of Israel, but nothing more than worry comes of it.
- That's because it is not the King of Israel who can help when Naaman comes calling; the king of Israel is as helpless as the king of Aram. It is the simple prophet Elisha that Naaman must seek.
- Then we come to the verse above. And guess what: "all the king's horses and all the king's men" are useless when it comes to putting either humpty dumpty or Naaman together

- again. The horses and chariots of military do not impress Elisha or do any good. No, poor Naaman has to take off all his armour, get down from his chariot, leave his precious horses, and enter just the bare humanity of him into the waters of the Jordan to be healed. He is offended. And aren't we all when we feel "cast down from our thrones?"
- Thus, it is not finally Naaman's wisdom or bravery that leads him into the healing waters, but once again it is the advice and encouragement of a servant, convincing him to do what Elisha has prescribed.

I have taken note of that one particular verse above because it seems to me that music does to listeners what Elisha's instruction does to Naaman. Both look for, and call out, the humanity in people who often hide behind some image they create for themselves. In Naaman's case it was the mighty warrior. Why should a mighty warrior have to stoop to the indignity of setting down all his hard-earned military accoutrements and weapons and bathe like just another ordinary human in the waters of the Jordan? Elisha sees through the image to the human being who needs to be healed. Doesn't music regularly do that same thing? It doesn't see our superiority or inferiority complexes, it doesn't care how rich or poor we are. It just sings to the soul in our humanity. That, I think, is why the "Good Word" is such a good friend of good music. It is not the ego but the soul that truly sings for joy.


