*Mother Earth* was commissioned by and is dedicated to Brian Silvey and the South Dearborn High School Band of Aurora, Indiana.

Born in New Bedford, Massachusetts, David Maslanka attended the Oberlin College Conservatory where he studied composition with Joseph Wood. He spent a year at the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria, and did graduate work in composition at Michigan State University with H. Owen Reed. He has served on the faculties of State University of New York at Geneseo, Sarah Lawrence College, New York University, and Kingsborough College of the City University of New York. He now lives in Missoula, Montana.

Especially well known in the band world, Maslanka's works for winds and percussion include *A Child's Garden of Dreams for Symphonic Wind Ensemble*; *Concerto for Piano, Winds and Percussion*; the 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> symphonies; and *Mass* for soloists, chorus, boy's chorus, wind orchestra, and organ. In addition, he has written a wide variety of chamber, orchestral, and choral pieces. The St. Olaf Band, through generous support from the Miles Johnson Endowment, co-commissioned Maslanka's 5<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> symphonies, the *Clarinet Concerto*, and *David's Book*, his concerto for percussion.

**Danse sacrée** (1904)  
from *Danses pour Harpe Chromatique*

**Claude Debussy** (1862–1918)

This work long outlasted its original intent. In 1904 Pleyel, the famous Parisian firm of instrument manufacturers, approached Debussy with a commission for a new test piece for chromatic harp. Pleyel had introduced and patented the chromatic harp in 1897. This was a harp with no pedals, quite different from the conventional concert harp, which is tuned according to the notes of the diatonic major scale, and has seven foot pedals, each of which corresponds to a single scale degree and its chromatic alterations (i.e. natural, sharp, and flat). With Pleyel's instrument, a separate string was provided for each chromatic note throughout its range.

Debussy's response to Pleyel's request was to compose his *Danses pour Harpe Chromatique*, which eventually took a place among the best-known and most frequently performed works for harp in the concert repertory. Almost from the outset, the work was played more often on the conventional orchestral harp, since the chromatic harp was soon abandoned, mostly because of its unwieldy size and the inordinate amount of time required to tune it before every performance. This is perhaps the reason why the work is now better known as *Danses sacrée et profane* (Sacred and Profane Dances).

The *Danse sacrée* is marked by pastel transparency, modal harmonies, and an aura of antiquity. It begins with a quiet but stately unison melody to which the harp responds with a theme of arpeggiated chords. The harp then meanders peacefully through landscapes of parallel harmonies quite typical of Debussy, pausing here and there to refer back to the initial themes.

**Chamarita!** (1981)

**Roger Nixon** (1921–2009)

Born and raised in California's Central Valley, Roger Nixon acquired a taste for the rhythms and dances of the early settlers of the area. He earned his Ph.D. from the University of California at Berkeley, and he joined the faculty at San Francisco State University in 1960. He wrote more than 60 compositions for orchestra, band, choir and opera.

*Chamarita!* was commissioned jointly by the National Endowment for the Arts and the University of Florida in commemoration of the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Kappa Kappa Psi, the National Band Service Fraternity. The work displays Nixon's refined sense for orchestration and his penchant for using the folk music of his home state as primary material. It embodies some of the imagery and spirit of the Chamarita Festival of Half Moon Bay, California, one of several Holy Ghost celebrations held annually by that state's Portuguese communities. The festival receives its name from a favorite folk dance from the Azores.

**Méditation** from *Thaïs* (1894)

**Jules Massenet** (1842–1912)

Massenet's opera *Thaïs*, based upon the novel by Anatole France, is set in fourth-century Egypt and tells how the monk Athanaël converts the courtesan Thaïs to Christianity. Dramatic conflict arises when, after Thaïs becomes a nun, Athanaël loses his heart to her, and hence his own soul. The *Méditation*, a sublime melody originally set by Massenet for solo violin against a background of strings and harp, is an intermezzo between the first and second scenes of Act II depicting the moment of Thaïs' religious conversion.

**Funeral March**

To the memory of Norwegian Composer Rikard Nordraak

Edvard Grieg attributed his deep-rooted interest in creating music built upon Norwegian folk traditions to his relationship with Rikard Nordraak (1842–1866), a young composer who burned brightly with the ideals of the rising nationalist movement in Norway. The two enjoyed a fast compositional and personal friendship. Grieg wrote about their first meeting:

“I will never forget this impression. Suddenly it seemed as if a mist fell from my eyes and I knew what I wanted. It was not exactly the same as what Nordraak wanted, but I believe the way to myself went through him.”

Grieg and Nordraak were in Europe in pursuit of their musical development when Nordraak died very suddenly in Berlin. Grieg was in Rome when he received this tragic news and composed the *Funeral March* for piano that same day. He later scored the work for military band and so treasured the music that he carried it with him wherever he went. An orchestral setting by Johan Halvorsen was performed for Grieg's interment.

**The Speech of Angels** (1996)

**Stephen Melillo** (b. 1957)

Stephen Melillo quickly established himself as a leading composer for bands by writing very expressive, emotional music that resonates with performers and audiences. His self-published catalog now includes over seventy compositions for band. Melillo has created approximately 900 works that range from movie and television soundtracks to interactive video scores, symphonies and an operatic musical.

Melillo writes:

“Music is well said to be the speech of angels.”  
—Thomas Carlyle

When reading the quote above, I instantly imagined that other, distant world, a place of Angels ... the realm of Music. As they glided and conversed in the language of the Universe, all things noble were told in a spaceless Space, a timeless Time. And yet, even

**When You Wish Upon a Star** (1940)

**Leigh Harline** (1907–1969)  
arr. Sammy Nestico

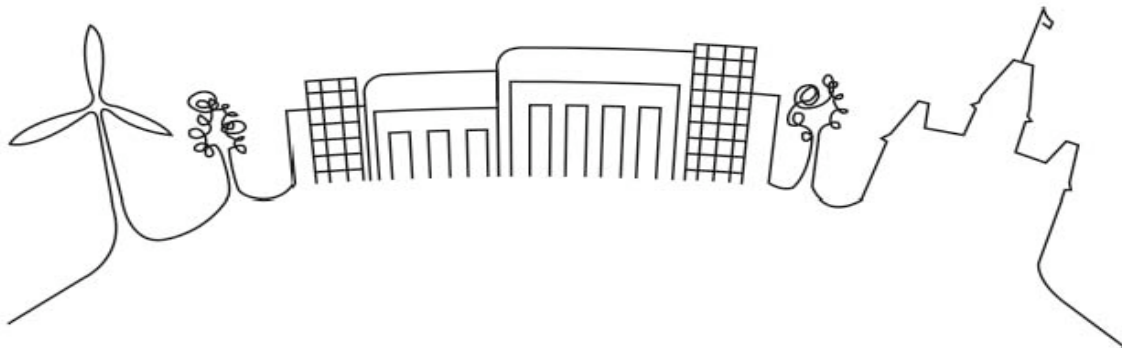
As one of the principal composers working for Walt Disney Studios, Leigh Harline graced the world with his memorable music for animated films, such as *Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs* and *Pinocchio*. The latter contained the classic *When You Wish Upon a Star*, which received the Academy Award for Best Song in 1940.

**Mambo Loco** from *Divertimento* (1999)

**Ira Hearshen** (b. 1948)

Having risen to great popularity during the classical period and favored by Mozart, Haydn and other Austrian composers, the divertimento as a musical form experienced a resurgence during the 20th century under the pens of notable composers as Bartók, Schuller and Persichetti. Ira Hearshen's *Divertimento for Band* presents five moments that capture the multicultural American experience, drawing upon popular and traditional styles indigenous to the United States, Europe and Latin America. *Mambo Loco* is a treatment of the infectious Cuban dance that swept the United States in the 1940s.

Ira Hearshen is currently one of the most sought after orchestrators in Hollywood and his impressive list of credits includes orchestrations for successful films such as *Guarding Tess*, *The Three Musketeers* and *Toy Story II*. His masterwork, *Symphony on Themes of John Philip Sousa*, was recorded by Frederick Fennell and the Tokyo Kosei Wind Orchestra and nominated for a Pulitzer Prize in 1997.
