During our process, a few things that rose to the surface were notions of rigor and assumption, particularly in regards to ballet and athleticism. While this is a solo for senior Georgia Wagnild, it is also a projection of aging by (also senior!) dancer Sally Rousse, so memories, experiences, and desires comingle. The pre-show lobby dance and the two side apron dancers are meant to both foreshadow the solo and conversely set up expectations that will never manifest. The audience is meant to take these three dances in not as a display of traditional dance virtuality but as common work, watching the body carry out tasks and survive repetition, boredom, pain, whimsy. Or just take it in.

## **Guest Choreographers**

**Paula Mann**'s journey took her from her Appalachian roots to Detroit teenage runaway, through Kent State in the 1970s, to NYU and the downtown dance scene of the 1980s. She has been a driving force in contemporary dance and performance based out of Minneapolis for the past 30 years, challenging, educating, and engaging artists, audiences, and communities with passion, inventiveness, and rigor. She was a full-time faculty at the U of M Department of Theater and Dance from 1993-2013 and is a 2019 McKnight Fellow in Choreography.

Scott Mettille holds a BA in Dance from the University of Minnesota and has been with Shapiro and Smith Dance since 2008. He also re-stages company repertory locally and across the country. Scott danced with Zenon Dance Company from 2011 to 2019, for whom he also acted as assistant technical coordinator. As a teaching professional, Scott regularly teaches intensive and master classes regionally, nationally, and internationally. He has performed professionally with Black Label Movement, Nic Lincoln, MN Opera, Stark Dance, and other local Minnesota companies.

Sally Rousse co-founded James Sewell Ballet in New York City in 1990, serving as its managing director and artistic associate throughout its move to Minneapolis in 1993. She has received two McKnight Fellowships for Dancers, a Sage Award for Outstanding Performer and was named Artist of the Year by CityPages. Her choreography has been seen in venues such as the Guthrie, Southern, and State Theaters, the Walker Art Center, MASS MoCA, the Cartoon Channel, and Harvard's American Repertory Theatre. Since leaving James Sewell Ballet in 2014, Rousse's site-specific work has taken dance off the traditional stage and featured artists who identify as LGBTQ, gender fluid, mature, disabled, female, native, and/or PoC. As the Cowles Center's first Artist in Residence, she engaged the community through free workshops, art installations, tours, discussions, and the acclaimed promenade performance *ICON SAM: Temple Dances*. Rousse performed as a leading dancer with the Royal Ballet of Flanders and Ballet Chicago, dancing works by Maurice Béjart, Jiri Kylian, and over 75 new works created on her by contemporary and post-modern choreographers.

**Laura Selle Virtucio** is a performer and dance teacher based in Minneapolis. She is a 2007 McKnight Dancer Fellow and holds a BFA in Dance from the University of Minnesota. Laura has danced with Shapiro and Smith Dance for 20 years and serves as the Artistic

Associate and Rehearsal Director. She also dances for Chris Schlicting and is on the faculty at the University of Minnesota and the St. Paul Conservatory for the Performing Arts. In past years, she had long tenures with Zenon Dance Company, Stuart Pimsler Dance and Theatre, and Carl Flink's Black Label Movement.
