#### *Note from the composer:*

The charm of the poetry of American author Sara Teasdale hides in a pure, even clear romanticism which is painted with the brush strokes of simple language. Her poem "Evening" carried me off on wings of birds and brought me to a place that I have only seen in my imagination — the green foot of a mountain on the shore of the sea, a blue sky with a few streaks of white, the sunset and a self-satisfied warm wind that drifts into sleep, birds, and, oh, this beautifully scented air...summer. Stepping over the threshold of one evening.

#### **Exaltation from Celestial Spring**

#### *Note from the composer:*

In choosing the text for this piece, I first considered the text used by Schütz in his double choir work. "Jauchzet dem Herren, alle welt" translates to, "Rejoice to the Lord, all the world." After understanding the full text more I thought the exclamation "Alleluia!" would simply capture the level of praise and gratitude that Schütz exhibited in his piece. Alleluia opens with a fanfare of imitation between both choirs, leading to a jubilant melody that sits on a driving ostinato. This, eventually, leads to a slower middle section, symbolizing reflection and high praise. Finally, we end on a triumphant note that, to me, highlights the strong meaning of the word "alleluia."

#### *Note from the composer:*

The text of *I Thought of You* draws on two of Sara Teasdale's short poems, "The Storm" and "Chance." Many of her poems speak honestly and simply about humanity and their sincerity and directness gives me constant inspiration. "The Storm" has two stanzas and "Chance" has only one and in this piece, I use "Chance" as a chorus, repeating it. There is a distinction between one person lying awake during a noisy storm with the number of people, strangers, passing on the street. However, the similarity between the relationships is key for me in the song if we think about the number of times we have missed an opportunity, whether we knew it or not. For me, the reference to the door of heaven is poignant: I wish we would notice that door more often.

#### Note from the composer:

When Thunder Comes is a celebration of American civil rights heroes: Sylvia Méndez, who challenged California's justice system in a fight for racial desegregation of schools; Helen Zia, Chinese-American lesbian feminist author. journalist, Fulbright scholar, and activist for peace; Harvey Milk, the first openly gay elected official in California's history, remembered as a vocal gay rights advocate; and Freedom Summer's "soldiers," who risked their lives in their movement to enfranchise black voters in Mississippi of the 1960s. Calling attention to our history's systemic erasure of the stories of marginalized human beings in the United States, Lewis's sonnet presents a powerful model for patriotism. The drums, a figurative representation of a grassroots revolution, provide thunder, and the singing relays the message that, once unified, our individual voices can come together and "drown out fear."

#### Note from the composer:

Rabindranath Tagore (1861-1941) was India's first Nobel laureate (1913, in literature), and a writer of plays, novels, music, and poetry. "The Ocean of Peace," written in the author's native Bengali and so beautifully translated into English by Krishna Dutta and Andrew Robinson, was originally intended to be sung as part of his play, The Post Office. Though the song never made it into a production of the play, Tagore in his final illness requested that it be sung at his own funeral. The text offers a profound and peaceful image of one standing at the threshold of the last voyage and, accompanied by a skilled and compassionate guide, setting forth on the journey into the "Great Unknown." The musical setting of Tagore's poem was commissioned in 2005 for the Crimson Chorale of Maple Grove Senior High School, Maple Grove, Minnesota, in memory of Amery Mills, a tenor in the choir who died tragically in his senior year.

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**Anton Armstrong**, Tosdal Professor of Music at St. Olaf College, became the fourth conductor of the St. Olaf Choir in 1990. He is a graduate of St. Olaf College and earned advanced degrees at the University of Illinois and Michigan State University. He is editor of a multicultural

choral series for Earthsongs Publications and co-editor (with John Ferguson) of the revised St. Olaf Choral Series for Augsburg Fortress Publishers. In June 1998, he began his tenure as founding conductor of the Oregon Bach Festival Stangeland Family Youth Choral Academy.

In January 2006, Baylor University selected Anton Armstrong from a field of 118 distinguished nominees to receive the Robert Foster Cherry Award for Great Teaching and spent February–June 2007 in residency at Baylor University as a visiting professor. In October 2009, he received the Distinguished Alumni Award from Michigan State University. In June 2013, Dr. Armstrong received the Saltzman Award from the Oregon Bach Festival. The festival's highest honor, the Saltzman Award is bestowed upon individuals who have provided exceptional levels of leadership to the organization. Dr. Armstrong is a highly sought-after clinician and guest conductor, and works with many of the world's most prestigious organizations and ensembles.

#### St. Olaf Choir



For more than a century, the **St. Olaf Choir**, conducted by Dr. Anton Armstrong, has set the gold standard for choral singing, performing for millions around the world. Composed of 75 mixed voices, the St. Olaf Choir is hailed as one of the nation's premier a cappella ensembles, renowned for its artistry and beauty of sound.

The St. Olaf Choir was founded in 1912 by F. Melius Christiansen, whose work established the ensemble's standard of excellence and its tradition of bringing music to audiences outside of campus. Christiansen chose spiritually profound music and pushed student musicians to perfect a tone that was disciplined, controlled, and free of excessive vibrato. That sound — securely in tune, controlled in pitch, smooth in delivery — became the choir's hallmark.

When Armstrong took the helm in 1990, his vast knowledge of music and his ability to articulate a vision to singers and audiences alike took the St. Olaf Choir to the next level, adding more flavor to its signature sound and further expanding its repertoire to include music of the Pacific Rim, Africa, and Latin America.

Under Armstrong's leadership, the choir continues to expand its touring horizons, engaging capacity audiences in major concert halls throughout the United States and worldwide. The ensemble has toured internationally 15 times. Most recently, in June 2019, the St. Olaf Choir toured Norway for two weeks with the St. Olaf Orchestra.

# Magnum Chorum

Recognized for expressive singing and inspired programs, Magnum Chorum brings transforming artistry and spirit to choral a cappella music. The 55-voice choir presents colorful concerts, commissions and premieres new sacred works, and provides music for worship. The choir also reaches under-served populations to offer a message of hope and faith and build community through fellowship and music. Founded in the choral tradition of St. Olaf College, the choir welcomes singers of all backgrounds devoted to excellence in choral music. Now offering its 31st season, Magnum Chorum is honored to serve as Choir in Residence at Westwood Lutheran Church in St. Louis Park.

In 2018, Dr. Dwight Jilek was appointed Artistic Director of Magnum Chorum. The choir has been led by prominent Artistic Directors Jin Kim (Founding Director), David Dickau, Christopher Aspaas, and Mark Stover, and performed with distinguished guest conductors Anton Armstrong, Kenneth Jennings, Sigrid Johnson, Brian
