Welcome to the St. Olaf Conference on Worship, Theology, and the Arts

The theme, "Scatter the Imagination of our Hearts" will inform all that we do together. In our worship and in our plenary sessions, in our rehearsals and in our small group gatherings; we will consider the many ways that we are being scattered. Scattering can be a breaking apart; a breaking apart of our prejudice, bias, limited viewpoints and imaginations, but also a breaking apart of our patterns (helpful or not) that are ripe for challenge. Scattering is also necessary in planting, like seeds that are scattered, the imagination of our hearts are scattered to plant and sow God's good work in the world. There is an element of prophetic challenge and good news in the act of scattering. We will ask, "What patterns need to be broken and scattered and what needs to be scattered and shared?"

We will experience a scattering as we gather to worship. While our worship services will move through the season of Advent, the familiarity of the Revised Common Lectionary will be scattered. Throughout the week, we will follow Wilda C. Gafney's "A Women's Lectionary for the Whole Church: Year W." The Magnificat will be woven into each service and the Advent season will offer a unifying theme of the "annunciations" of God's action. It includes in the annunciations to Hagar, Sarah and Abraham, the mother of Samson, Hannah, as well as Mary and Joseph. Gafney explains that, "Annunciations communicate an understanding of God involved in history and deeply involved in the lineage - ancestral and descendant - of God's people." Related to our theme, "Scatter the Imagination of the Hearts," annunciations scatter what we have imagined for our lives and for how the world could be, and reorient us around God's vision and action in our lives and in our world. We will find that Mary's Magnificat does not only name the scattering, but shows us a way to respond!

Throughout the week, worship, theology and art will come together to proclaim the prophetic challenge and good news of the scattering of the imagination of our hearts. Through word and sacrament, sung and heard, we will proclaim together our faith - a faith transformed and scattered!

Advent 4 Scripture Readings

1 Samuel 1:19-28

Hannah prayed and she said, "My heart exults in the HOLY ONE OF OLD; my horn is lifted up in my God. My mouth (opens) wide against my enemies, for I will rejoice in my victory. There is none holy like the MOST HIGH, none besides you; there is no rock like our God."

Matthew 1:18-25

Now this is how the birth of Jesus the Messiah happened: When his mother Mary had been betrothed to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to have a child in her womb from the Holy Spirit. Joseph her husband was a just man and unwilling to shame her, he wanted to divorce her secretly. But when he deliberated this, suddenly an angel of the Most High God appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for in her is conceived a child from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." All this happened to fulfill what had been spoken by the Most High God through the prophet: "Look now! The virgin shall conceive a child in her womb and give birth to a son, and they shall call him Emmanuel," which translated means, "God is with us." When Joseph got us from sleep, he did as the angel of the Mot High God commanded him. He took her as his wife, yet did not know her sexually until her birthing of a son and named him Jesus.






