Passacaglia (Homage on B-A-C-H) (1993)

Ron Nelson (1929-2023)

Note by the composer:

Passacaglia (*Homage on B-A-C-H*) is a set of continuous variations in moderately slow triple meter built on an eight-measure melody (basso ostinato) which is stated, in various registers, 25 times. It is a seamless series of tableaux which move from darkness to light.

Written in homage to Johann Sebastian Bach, it utilizes, as counterpoint throughout, the melodic motive represented by his name in German nomenclature, i.e. B-flat, A, C, and B-natural. Bach introduced this motive in his unfinished *The Art of the Fugue*, the textures of which are paraphrased (in an octatonic scale) in the fourth and fifth variations. The seventh variation incorporates Gustave Nottebohm's resolution (altered) of the unfinished final fugue of *The Art of Fugue*. The famous melody from Bach's *Passacaglia in C minor* appears once (also altered) in variation 19.

Passacaglia (Homage on B-A-C-H) was commissioned by the Eta-Omicron Chapter of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, The U.S. Air Force Band, and the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music Wind Studies Department, in celebration of the 125th Anniversary of the founding of The University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music.

Aspire (2022) Jennifer Higdon (b. 1962)

Note by the composer:

Having started my journey in music in the band world, I have always found this genre deeply moving. One of my first experiences of enjoying a band performance was hearing "The President's Own," on the U.S. Capitol steps during a summer vacation in Washington, D.C. To be asked to write a work for them was an incredible opportunity. I decided early in the process to create a work that would be more lyrical in nature, that would reflect the gifts and skills of these talented musicians, as well as their innermost values as individuals who strive to serve their country with great honor. In other words, I was inspired to create a piece that musically portrays the goal of striving to be our best . . . to aspire.

Zoom (2021) Scott Boerma (b. 1964)

Note by the composer:

The word "zoom" took on a new meaning during the pandemic [that started in 2020]. Meetings, classes, social gatherings, and holiday celebrations took the form of online video conferences and were generically called "Zooms." Those of us in the musical profession often had to resort to makeshift, substitute forms of ensemble performances that often resembled these gatherings.

One upside for me was a weekly Zoom hang that developed with four of my closest friends (all university band conductors) from across the country. One of those friends is Jamie Nix, for whom I was commissioned by his former graduate students to write this piece, in celebration of his 10th year as director of wind ensembles at Columbus State University. A common theme in our weekly chats was our unbridled enthusiasm (and impatience) to get back to what we love: making live music with our students. All of us have felt like we've been feverishly revving our engines behind the starting line, breathlessly waiting to see the green flag fly, knowing that the checkered flag awaits on the other side. Well, start your engines . . . because here we go . . . full speed ahead!

Dmitri Shostakovich (1906–1975)

For Dmitri Shostakovich, the publication of his *Symphony No. 5* in November of 1937 was a Hail Mary to save not only his musical career, but also himself.

The late 1930s marked a period in Soviet history known as the "Great Terror" in which Joseph Stalin sought to consolidate his rule over the U.S.S.R. by indiscriminately purging the country of hundreds of thousands perceived to be disloyal. On January 26th, 1936, Shostakovich accepted an invitation to watch a performance of his opera at the legendary Bolshoi Theatre in Moscow, only to discover that none other than Stalin himself was in attendance. Mortifyingly for Shostakovich, Stalin was unimpressed and left at the end of the third act, leaving the composer by all accounts as white as a sheet. Two days later, an unsigned editorial (likely ordered, or at least authorized by Stalin) appeared in the official newspaper of the Communist Party, *Pravda* ("Truth"), titled "Muddle Instead of Music." The paper decried Shostakovich as anti-Soviet, claiming that *Lady Macbeth of Mtsensk* "tickles the perverted taste of the bourgeois." The editorial concluded that "The power of good music to infect the masses has been sacrificed to a petty-bourgeois, 'formalist' attempt to create originality through cheap clowning. It is a game of clever ingenuity that may end very badly."

The thinly-veiled threat was not lost on Shostakovich, whose musical career and reputation went from sterling to the gutter overnight. *Lady Macbeth of Mtsensk* was banned, the premiere of his Fourth Symphony was canceled indefinitely, and news publications that had previously praised Shostakovich's music were quick to fall in line with *Pravda* in decrying him. Only a small number of prominent Soviet artists publicly came to Shostakovich's defense, including playwright Isaac Babel, author/literature critic Abram Lezhnev, and theater director Vsevolod Myerhold. All three were executed in the purges. It was in this period of desperation that Shostakovich wrote his Fifth Symphony, premiering it the next year in his hometown of Leningrad (now St. Petersburg) on November 21, 1937. The fourth movement, although brazenly powerful, is purported by some friends and associates of the late composer to be a sort of compulsory celebration, almost a caricature of a traditional military march. Although initially met with disapproval by government officials, the work was a smash hit with the Russian public, with the first performance reported to have brought the audience to tears and received an ovation lasting over half an hour. Public grief was heavily frowned upon by the government, and such a raw expression of Shostakovich's resolve, fear, anguish, and forced servility resonated strongly with an audience that had also endured the purges.

The government claimed that Shostakovich had taken their criticisms well into account, although their interpretation of the work was starkly different from that of much of the public as they took it at face value. In a twist of irony, the official stance was that Shostakovich had redeemed himself by composing a work in line with the ideals of the Soviet government. Even so, it's unrealistic to assume that Stalin's government was completely convinced of Shostakovich's loyalty — they might have simply made the calculus that supporting him during his popularity was politically beneficial.

Today, Shostakovich's *Symphony No. 5* endures as one of his most popular and widely-played works, symbolizing both his remarkable talent and harrowing discord with the highest echelons of the USSR. To this day, debates rage as to whether the piece is a celebration of the spirit of the Soviet Union, a sarcastic protest against oppression, or simply a raw outpouring of grief and hope for a suffering people — although you will note, none of these interpretations are mutually exclusive. You'll have to judge for yourself.

Rodeo

Aaron Copland (1900-1990)

V. Hoe-Down

Although steeped in European influence and educated in Paris, France, Aaron Copland pioneered a new American style of classical music in the 20th century. His ballet, *Rodeo*, helped produce that American style through a celebration of the Wild West, a key aspect of the traditional American identity. Today, Copland is one of the most influential composers in the American musical canon, due in no small part to *Rodeo*.

Rodeo was written as a ballet for Agnes de Mille, a dancer and choreographer who starred in the 1942 premiere. Each of the four dance episodes in *Rodeo* tells the story of a cowgirl who tries to win the affection of the Head Wrangler in the Wild West. This ballet touches on themes of conflict, loneliness, and love. In the acclaimed *Hoe-Down*, our protagonist has found love with another cowboy, giving the ballet a happy ending. *Hoe-Down* brings out the most lively elements in Copland's music by presenting an animated rhythm and spirited melodies from traditional cowboy songs.

In today's era, Modest Mussorgsky is remembered as one of the staples of Russian music in the 19th century, especially known for his music depicting artwork for the listener's imagination. In *Pictures at an Exhibition*, entire worlds have been transformed into majestic orchestral melodies painted by the orchestra, inviting the audience to ponder and imagine vivid vignettes and colorful scenes.

Modest Mussorgsky showed skill in improvisation and the piano from a young age, but he lived in a place that sometimes saw music as a dishonorable practice. Mussorgsky overcame many challenges throughout his life in order to obtain a musical education. In Russia, many of the musically talented youth were forced by their families to pursue careers in more traditional positions, and Mussorgsky himself was pressured into pursuing a military career. As the years passed, however, he decided to devote himself entirely to music, especially piano composition.

Pictures at an Exhibition was written as a piano suite, inspired after Mussorgsky's stroll past the 1874 posthumous exhibition of watercolors and drawings by the composer's dear friend, Victor Hartmann. In 1922, conductor Serge Koussevitzky urged French composer Maurice Ravel to create an orchestral transcription of the piano suite. It is this orchestral arrangement that is most commonly performed today.

The 10 movements, each corresponding to a piece of art, use varied instrumentation and rich melodies to paint the picture in the listener's head. The last two movements, *The Hut on Fowl's Legs* and *The Great Gate of Kiev*, both include folkloric melodies. The former has all the elements of mysticism and magic, with fast passages and musical grandeur that truly create the image of a witch that lives in a hut with chicken legs. The work finishes with the majestic painting of *The Great Gate of Kiev*, with grandiose melodies that truly show the nationalist movement in Russian 19th-century music. Thanks to Ravel and Mussorgsky, we can enjoy a visit to Hartmann's exhibition without leaving the comfort of our seats.

The Turtle Dove

arr. G. Winston Cassler (1906–1990)

The Turtle Dove, also known as "Fare Thee Well," is an English folk tune that dates back to at least the 18th century. The first published version of the song is from the 1710 song book Roxburghe Ballads. Two centuries later, widely-known composer and folk song specialist Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958) took an interest with the tune, as he not only produced a recording of the song sung by Sussex innkeeper David Penfold, but also continued to arrange the tune for solo baritone and later for full SATB choir. Arranger Glenn Winston Cassler was a prolific hymn writer and organist. He studied at Oberlin College before becoming a music professor at St. Olaf College. Cassler's orchestral arrangement of The Turtle Dove has been used for decades by the St. Olaf Orchestra as an encore piece to bid the audience farewell as the concert draws to an end. The original vocal lyrics to The Turtle Dove follow a dialogue of two lovers saying goodbye to each other before departing on a journey. The orchestral arrangement begins with a sweeping introduction with flute and strings that swells before the melody is stated by solo oboe. The oboe melody is restated in the cellos and finally all instruments before dwindling down to just the solo oboe for one final echo of the melody. The piece ends in a warm transition to the major mode by the string section.
