



#### The St. Olaf College Dance Department

The St. Olaf College Dance Department offers a nurturing environment in which to pursue a BA in Dance with training, performing, and choreography opportunities in Modern/Contemporary, West African, Hip Hop, Ballet, International dance, Ballroom, Jazz, and Tap. The department consists of three core faculty plus eight adjunct faculty, a full-time technical director, and a staff musician. The Dance Department graduates an average of 8-10 dance majors a year and serves over 500 students yearly.

The St. Olaf College Dance Department engages students in the study of dance as a vital form of human expression, understanding, communication, and interaction. Partnering with the College's liberal arts curriculum and making connections with other academic fields, the dance program encourages the exploration of complex ideas through investigation, knowledge, and expression of the body.

Our program combines embodied practice with critical thinking to root dance forms from around the world in their culturally, socially, and politically informed values. This is a fundamental means of self-discovery, understanding other dancing bodies, and advancing an anti-racist, equitable, and just community. Whether students in our program become dance artists, choreographers, scholars, teachers or integrate their skills and knowledge into other fields, they grow into movers, makers, and thinkers who responsibly respond to, serve, and shape the world around them.

# **Faculty Biographies**

Joel Arpin (he/him) is a professional drummer/percussionist and composer based in Minneapolis who performs, records, and teaches many styles of music. Joel is an active composer and has been commissioned to write for dance productions in many parts of the world Joel currently serves as the Lead Staff Musician for the Dance Department at St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minnesota. Joel holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Percussion Performance from the University of Wisconsin.

As a 15-year-old mediocre soccer player, **Brianna Rae Johnson** (she/her) walked into her high school's dance studio and never looked back. She went on to receive Dance and Biology degrees, with a concentration in American Racial and Multicultural Studies, from St. Olaf College and earned a Master of Fine Arts in Dance from The Ohio State University. With great gratitude, she has returned to St. Olaf College as a Visiting Assistant Professor.

As a mover, she has focused on postmodern release technique, floorwork, contact improvisation, Latinx social dance, and West African Dance. Brianna has performed and toured nationally and internationally with Robin Stethem's Dancing People Company and in work by Paula Mann. She has also performed in works by Erin Drummond, Matthew Janczewski, Merce Cunningham, Katherine Moore, Claire Melbourne, Kathryn Nusa Logan, Alito Alessi, and Karen Nelson. As a maker, she creates immersive, intermedia, and interactive works for the stage, gallery, and screen. She has choreographed pieces for Alternative Motion Project and students at St. Olaf College, Winona State University, Carthage College, and The Ohio State University. Her choreography has been presented at numerous festivals and venues throughout the Midwest, and her screendances have been selected for festivals around the world.

**Tumelo (Melo) Khupe** (she/her) is a performing artist, krumper, and emerging choreographer based in the Twin Cities originally from Botswana. Her artistry investigates and explores how the body manifests lived experiences through movement. Krump is foundational in her work as it offers endless possibilities for storytelling through its technique and language. She makes use of some elements of theater to reveal these moments through freestyle or improvisation.

She graduated with a BA in Music Theater with a minor in Dance. Some awards received are the David Wick Leadership Award, the David Wick Best Choreography Award, and The Mabel Meta Frey Outstanding Theater Artist Award. She is a Naked Stages Fellow, Generating Room Fellow, a Chawrchā, a next-generation choreographic lab Fellow and most recently McKnight dance Fellows (2024-25) She has performed with Emmy award-winning company, Hip Hop Nutcracker.

**Darrius Strong** (he/him) is a highly accomplished choreographer, dancer, and educator based in the Twin Cities. His creative work has garnered recognition and been featured in prestigious venues such as the Walker Art Centers, Choreographers Evening, and Rhythmically Speaking. As the founder and artistic director of STRONGmovement and the director of the Hip Hop program at Eleve Performing Arts Center, Strong continues to push boundaries and inspire others through his innovative approach to movement.

Notable highlights of Strong's career include being featured in the 2015 New Griots Festival and an American Standard Billboard advertisement in NYC's Times Square in 2016. In 2017, he received the Momentum New Works recipient award, acknowledging his outstanding contributions to the field. Strong has also served as the Movement Director for esteemed theater organizations such as Guthrie Theater and Ten Thousand Things Theater, lending his expertise and artistic vision to enhance stage performances.

His choreographic talents have been sought after by renowned dance companies including Threads Dance Project, Flying Foot Forum, Alternative Motion Projects, TU Dance, and James Sewell Ballet, where he has created captivating works. Additionally, Strong has dedicated the past seven years to bringing Hip Hop knowledge and technique to Anoka Middle School for the Arts, making a significant impact on the next generation of dancers.

Beyond the realm of dance, Strong has made his mark as a movement director for musicians as well. He has collaborated with notable bands such as Noneabove and has provided movement direction for various cover bands performing at prestigious galas.

Recognized for his artistic excellence, Strong is a recipient of the 2019 Jerome Hill Fellowship and the 2022 Choreographer McKnight Fellowship, solidifying his position as a trailblazer in the dance community.

**Kyle Marshall** (he/him) is a choreographer, performer, teacher and artistic director of Kyle Marshall Choreography (KMC), a dance company that sees the dancing body as a container of history, an igniter of social reform and a site of celebration. Since inception in 2014, KMC has performed at venues including: Chelsea Factory, BAM Next Wave Festival, Jacob's Pillow Inside/Out, Actors Fund Arts Center, NJPAC, Little Island, and Roulette. Kyle has received choreographic and dance film commissions from the Baryshnikov Arts Center, "Dance on the Lawn", Montclair's Dance Festival, Harlem Stage and THE SHED.

Kyle has received a 2018 NY Dance and Performance Juried Bessie Award, a 2020 Dance Magazine Harkness Promise Award and a 2020 Bessie Honoree for his revival of Colored (2017). He has also received choreographic fellowships from Princeton University, Center for Ballet and the Arts, and residencies from Monira Foundation, 92nd st Y, CPR, and Bethany Arts Community. As an educator, Kyle has conducted masterclasses, creative workshops, set choreography at schools including; ADF,

Rutgers University, Ailey/Fordham University, Sarah Lawrence College, County Prep High School, and Eugene Lang/New School. He is currently an adjunct professor at NYU's Open Arts Program and Drew University. Kyle is a former member of the Trisha Brown Dance Company, doug elkins choreography etc., and Tiffany Mills Company. He is a graduate of Rutgers University with a BFA in Dance and a NJ Arts Fellow.

Jeffrey Peterson (he/him) is the Program Director and Assistant Professor of Dance at Winona State University in Winona, MN. He holds a Certification in Laban/Bartenieff Movement Analysis (L/BMA) from Integrated Movement Studies, an MFA in dance from New York University's Tisch School of the Arts, and a BFA in dance from the University of Minnesota - Twin Cities. Peterson's choreography has been called "Poetic Precision" by the Minnesota Star Tribune and "moving and heart racingly joyous" by the St. Paul Pioneer Press.

Driven by the personal and political, his work is founded upon the spatial complexity and precision of drum corps, the interior world of somatics, the bending of jazz and modern dance, and an eclectic approach to composition. He aims to create integrative, mind-body-spirit experiences for performers and audiences alike. He's been commissioned by Dance New Amsterdam, Movement Research at Judson Church, Dixon Place, Rhythmically Speaking, and numerous dance programs in Higher Education.
