David Gillingham is an American composer known for his dramatic, expressive writing and his unique ability to integrate percussion into wind and orchestral settings. A former percussionist and music educator, Gillingham served in the U.S. Army Band during the Vietnam War and later earned a doctorate in music composition. His works often reflect themes of conflict, spirituality, and nature, and he has become a staple in the wind ensemble repertoire. *Concertino for Four Percussionists and Wind Ensemble* showcases this affinity by giving equal prominence to each soloist across a wide range of instruments — mallet percussion, timpani, snare drum, cymbals, and more. The piece unfolds in three continuous sections, shifting from high-energy rhythmic passages to moments of lyrical introspection. Gillingham integrates the percussion quartet with the wind ensemble in a dynamic dialogue, creating a vibrant exchange of color, rhythm, and momentum. The result is both a virtuosic display of percussion and a compelling example of late-20th-century American wind music.

Alexander Fyodorovich Goedicke (1877–1957) tr. Claude Rippas (b. 1946)

Lexi Cucchiaro '25, trumpet

Alexander Fyodorovich Goedicke was a prominent Russian composer, pianist, and educator whose music blends the grandeur of German Romanticism with Russian lyricism. A graduate of the Moscow Conservatory, he studied under pianists Paul Pabst and Vasili Safonov. In 1900, he won the prestigious Anton Rubinstein Competition for his concert piece for piano and orchestra, which launched his career as a respected composer and performer. Over the decades, he composed operas, symphonies, chamber music, and numerous concertos, and held teaching positions at the Moscow Conservatory. Goedicke's Trumpet Concerto in B-flat major, op. 41, stands out in the trumpet repertoire for its virtuosic demands and lyrical intensity. Cast in a single movement, the work includes an extended, dramatic cadenza and frequently shifts tempo and character, although the recurring main theme serves as a unifying thread across its contrasting sections. Rich in Romantic expression, the concerto tests the soloist's agility, articulation, and endurance. Though it remains less performed than other trumpet concertos, it offers a compelling showcase of the instrument's capabilities.

Twist (2013) Jodie Blackshaw (b. 1971)

Australian composer Jodie Blackshaw is a leading voice in wind band music, recognized for her advocacy of creativity, equity, and inclusivity in music education. A graduate of the Australian National University, Blackshaw challenges conventional notions of band music by incorporating improvisation, theatricality, and player-driven choices into her compositions. Her works are often guided by strong philosophical and educational principles, aiming to engage performers on a deeper emotional and personal level.

Twist, composed in 2012, reflects this philosophy. The piece is built on short motivic material that "twists" through a variety of moods and textures, evolving through shifts in rhythm, orchestration, and ensemble interaction. It includes improvisatory sections, body percussion, and unique sounds that challenge performers to think beyond traditional notation. Twist is a striking example of Blackshaw's belief in music-making as a collaborative, expressive act — transforming the wind ensemble into a living, breathing soundscape that is different in every performance. Twist is inspired by the shape, spirit, and history of Australia's magnanimous waterway, the Murray River (the Wiradjuri people of the Albury-Wodonga region call the river Millewa) and is divided into six sections: Survival, Reflection, Discovery, Obsession, Carnevale, and Ascension.
