Overture to *The Wreckers* (1904, tr. 2025)

Ethel Smyth (1858–1944) tr. Jeremy Makkonen

(Transcription Premiere)
Commissioned in part by the St. Olaf Band and St. Olaf College

Les naufrageurs ("The Wreckers") is a three-act opera by Dame Ethel Smyth, with a French libretto by Henry Brewster. Inspired by tales of Cornish villagers who lured ships to their doom to plunder cargo, Smyth conceived the idea after a walking tour of Cornwall in 1886. Though composed in French in 1904, the opera first premiered in a heavily cut German translation, titled Strandrecht, in Leipzig in 1906. Dissatisfied with the alterations, Smyth removed the performance materials herself, halting further shows there. With support from conductor Sir Thomas Beecham and financial backing from Mary Dodge, the opera premiered in English as The Wreckers in London in 1909 and later appeared at Covent Garden in 1910. Gustav Mahler had considered the work for the Vienna State Opera before his dismissal upended that opportunity. The work was rarely staged between 1939 and a landmark BBC Proms semi-staging in 1994, which led to recordings and later productions. These included regional performances, such as Duchy Opera's 2006 Cornish staging and Bard Summerscape's acclaimed 2015 production in the United States. Arcadian Opera honored Smyth in 2018, linking the opera to the centenary of women's suffrage. Glyndebourne Opera finally performed Les naufrageurs in its original French in 2022.

Notes from the composer:

This quotation comes from Thich Nhat Hanh's *The Art of Living*. This book is a collection of the Vietnamese monk's ruminations on life and death that guided my partner Glen Adsit through his personal struggles when confronted with his own mortality. As well as being my beloved life partner and musical collaborator, Glen was a beloved figure in the music community who touched the lives of countless collaborators and students. In the wake of Glen's sudden passing in January 2024, we have all become the rain to Glen's cloud. His inextinguishable spirit and profound influence continue to resonate deeply within all of us. Although his physical body is no longer with us, we now constitute his continuation body and are charged with continuing his legacy of support and love for one another. This piece is a tribute to Glen, the physical life we shared together, and the new life we share as I continue his legacy in my own way. It reflects the profound love and connection we share, both personally and through our collaborative musical endeavors. The piece is lyrical and tender, inviting listeners into the intimate emotional spaces Glen and I navigated together. It captures the essence of Glen's loving spirit — missed by many, cherished by those who experienced his warmth and guidance, and still apparent in the life and work of his family, colleagues, and students. It is both a celebration of Glen's life and the enduring bond he and I share and a tribute to the legacy of love and artistic collaboration that he left behind for all of us to continue together.

Notes from the composer:

This concertino for oboe draws its fire from the world of salsa and is dedicated to the memory of Frank Chen, father of the soloist Nathaniel Chen. Frank danced with boundless soul, and his passion for movement lives on through his two children, Nathaniel and Natalina, who inherited his love for dance. Built on the heartbeat of salsa, the work weaves together the clave rhythm, rich harmonic progressions, and a soloist whose voice shapes and reshapes the music with each new idea.

Dana Maeda is an oboist and educator on the faculty of St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minnesota. As a public and private school educator and studio instructor, she has worked with students from preschool through retirement age. At St. Olaf, her responsibilities include teaching the oboe studio, woodwind techniques, education methods, chamber music, directing the Collegium Musicum (Renaissance Wind Ensembles), and supervision of instrumental student teachers. A founding 34-year member of the WindWorks Woodwind Quintet and 30-year member of the Rochester Symphony, Dana frequently performs in the Twin Cities. Some of her favorite performance opportunities include: Minneapolis Pops Orchestra, Bach Roots Festival, Bach Society of Minnesota, Minnetonka Choral Society, Music St. Croix, working with violinist Midori, the Moody Blues, and pit orchestras for Broadway shows at the Ordway.

Notes from the composer:

Symphony in Blue and Gold was commissioned to celebrate the 100th anniversary of bands at my alma mater, the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire.

As a starting point, I researched and studied two significant pieces in wind band literature that were composed around the time the band was first formed on campus. These were *La création du monde* (1923) by Darius Milhaud and *Rhapsody in Blue* (1924) by George Gershwin, specifically the original dance band version orchestrated by Ferde Grofé. Both pieces use a combination of classical and jazz influences, and this felt very reflective of my own experience as a music student at UWEC.

Overall, the piece uses a modified four-movement symphony plan. The first movement, "Blues and Fugues," alternates a standard 12-bar blues with two four-voice fugues. The opening tenor saxophone solo presents the UWEC melodic material that appears throughout all four movements. The second movement, "In Gold," focuses on timbres played by metallic instruments and introduces the other main melodic material, which musically spells out "BLUGLD." The third movement is a waltz and the final movement, "Finale," expands and combines material from the previous three movements.

I am so honored to have the opportunity to write *Symphony in Blue and Gold* for a place where I had so much musical and personal growth. I truly took this opportunity to heart, and tried to grow my own compositional voice and craft while writing this piece as a tribute to a place that was so important in my educational journey.
