# PROGRAM NOTES

# NORSEMAN BAND MICHAEL BUCK '89, CONDUCTOR

Antithigram (1977) Jack Stamp (b. 1954)

Notes from the composer:

Antithigram is coined from the words "antithesis" and "program." The work is bi-thematic — the first theme is comprised of 11 notes and the second is more like a chorale in structure. A four-note tone cluster (B-flat, C, F-sharp, B-natural) appears in the first measure and subsequently appears as an arpeggiated ostinato (B-flat, C, and F-sharp, in orchestra bells and vibraphone) that underpins and adheres subsequent sections. After the themes are treated in a number of traditional ways (two-voice counterpoint, canon, chorale, and diminution), they are joined at measure 110 in a polychordal statement.

**Jack Stamp** served as professor of music, director of band studies, and music department chair at Indiana University of Pennsylvania for 25 years. His roles included conducting the Wind Ensemble and teaching graduate conducting. Throughout his career and continuing in retirement, he remains an active composer and clinician. Dr. Stamp lives in Hudson, Wisconsin and can be frequently seen on stage in the Twin Cities with the Lake Wobegon Brass Band, based out of Anoka, Minnesota.

## On a Southern Hymnsong (1993)

David Holsinger (b. 1945)

Notes from the composer:

On a Southern Hymnsong is based on the spiritual entitled "There Is a Balm in Gilead" found in many denominational hymnals throughout the country. The composer was surprised to find, during his investigation into the song's history, that the origin of this "spiritual" is a bit cloudier than would be presumed. Although White spirituals were published in shape-note tunebooks two decades before Negro spirituals began to appear in print, both bodies of congregational folk song existed side by side in the pre-Civil War period. It is clear that these bodies of song intermingled and influenced each other, but the evidence is insufficient for either tradition to claim priority to several of our more familiar spirituals, "Gilead" included in that list. Regardless of their label, spirituals have become a deeply meaningful expression of a common faith for many American congregations.

This composition was commissioned by Betty Bates, director of the fine Scottsboro High School Symphonic Band in Scottsboro, Alabama. It joins a series of hymnsong compositions based on traditional hymns of America.

## First Suite in E-flat for Military Band (1909)

III. March

Gustav Holst (1874–1934)

Gustav Holst's *First Suite in E-flat for Military Band* ushers in an important development in the concert band literature canon, as bands began transitioning from light-hearted outdoor entertainment to serious indoor musical ensembles. The creation of a concert band multi-movement suite, paying homage to long-established orchestral suite and symphony formats, brings a new depth of musical engagement to the wind band genre. Holst astutely embraces the sophistication made possible through this musical form by utilizing many expected techniques to tie together the contrasting movements and unify the overall composition.

All three movements of this suite prominently feature a three–note motif based on the pitches E-flat, F and C. The "March" begins with the musically equivalent inversion of this motif, E-flat, D, and G. Many aspects of a typical march are found in the final movement. A brief, but catchy opening is followed by the introduction of the first theme. The second melody contrasts with the first in both style and grandeur, yet both show a tuneful folk-like quality typical of many early wind band compositions. A development-like section follows, analogous to the "B" section found in a sonata form symphonic movement. Melodic fragments and numerous key changes comprise the thematic explorations and signal the ensuing recapitulation. Especially in later Romantic era manifestations, the recapitulation weaves in themes from the entire suite, bringing the work to a satisfying conclusion.

*El Camino Real* ("The King's Highway") (1985)

Alfred Reed (1925–2005)

Notes from the composer:

*El Camino Real* (literally "The Royal Road" or "The King's Highway") was commissioned by, and is dedicated to, the 581st Air Force Band (AFRES) and its commander, Lt. Col. Ray E. Toler. Composed during the latter half of 1984 and completed in early 1985, it bears the subtitle "A Latin Fantasy."

The music is based on a series of chord progressions common to countless generations of Spanish flamenco (and other) guitarists, whose fiery style and brilliant playing have captivated millions of music lovers throughout the world. These progressions and the resulting key relationships have become practically synonymous with what we feel to be the true Spanish idiom. Together with the folk melodies they have underscored, in part derived by a procedure known to musicians as the "melodizing of harmony," they have created a vast body of what most people would consider authentic Spanish music.

The first section of the music is based upon the dance form known as the *Jota*, while the second, contrasting section is derived from the fandango, but here altered considerably in both time and tempo from its usual form. Overall, the music follows a traditional three-part pattern: fast-slow-fast.
